MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRINCIPAL

AP SUMMER WORK:

Each student enrolled in an Advanced Placement (AP) class next year will be responsible for summer work. An AP class is equivalent to a first-year college course. Because the tests are given in May and the amount of material covered is in greater depth than a senior level class, it is necessary to make assignments over the summer. Students have the opportunity to keep academic skills sharp and enter the class in the fall ready to discuss work already finished.

Summer work will become part of the first quarter grade and is, therefore, important to the AP student. Scheduling is based on choices that have been made this spring, and students enrolled as of June 16th of this year will be placed in AP courses, even if summer work is not complete.

Please make sure that summer work is obtained from the AP teacher before the end of this school year.

- Food for Lane County: Pack lunches for free summer lunch program in the parks;
- Riverpark, Good Samaritan, and other assisted-living centers: Assist in recreational activities with senior citizens;
- Special Olympics: Assist children with developmental disabilities in sports competitions;
- Grassroots Garden: Help grow the food that Food For Lane County uses to feed the poor;
- Birth to Three: Recreational childcare setting, playing with children while parents attend classes;
- Sacred Heart Medical Center: Deliver flowers and mail to patients;
- Headstart: Preschool setting assisting with children of low-income families;
- Other areas that need help: ARC of Lane County, Lane Shelter Care, Catholic Community Services, St. Vincent dePaul, and others.

Students should see Mrs. Leahy for help, or check the Christian Service Board next to the cafeteria before the end of the school year. They should also purchase a Christian Service Manual for \$5.00 at the Marist Bookstore before school is out. These manuals contain everything a student needs to know to begin their service hours, an explanation of how to begin, lists of acceptable service organizations and their phone numbers, and the journal pages necessary to reflect on service as they perform it.
