SENIOR FAMILIES

Applications

- The college application process is well underway!
- November 1 was the first major early application option offered by some colleges.
- November 15 and December 1 are also common early options as well. Regular (i.e., final) deadline options will be coming up as early as November 15 (the University of Washington) or November 30 (California Public Universities)
- Most other colleges' final deadlines will be January 1 or later.
- Always check the college's website for the exact deadline details and other information. For most students, applications to four-year universities should be completed and submitted by mid-December.
- Most students who stick to this timeline will be glad they did. Two exceptions would be students who are doing much better academically now than in past years and may benefit from making sure their first semester grades are included in their admittance consideration.
- Students applying to Lane Community College and other two-year colleges can wait until after Christmas Break to begin applications.

Updating Naviance

- Seniors need to keep their college list in Naviance updated and accurate, not just in Common App.
- Non-Common App colleges need to be manually entered into Naviance.
- This should be done throughout the application process.
- It is how the counselor knows what to send, where, and by what deadline.
- In the "**Colleges I am Applying to**" tab, students indicate which colleges they are applying to, how they are applying (using the Common Application or not) when they are applying (meaning which application deadline, such as Early Action, Early Decision, Rolling, Regular Decision).
- The program also lets us know once a student has submitted their application and requested to have their transcripts sent. **Counselors will not send the school forms until a student has submitted their application.**
- Once students hear back from colleges, the admission decision should also be updated. (Admitted, denied, deferred, waitlisted etc.)

Common Application Matching - Really Important

- Students using the Common Application to apply to one or more schools also need to link their Common App account with their Naviance account.
- The FERPA waiver must be completed first and then linked to the account.
- This is necessary because counselors need to submit the school forms for the application of those colleges.
- The only way we can do that is if the accounts are linked. If a student has a question regarding linking, there is a video located on our college planning site on the Marist counseling page.

- FAFSA
 - The <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u> is the form students and families need to fill out to get any financial aid from the federal government to help pay for college. This form is available beginning **December 1 tentatively this year due to changes in the FAFSA**.

We had a very successful event on October 18, featuring keynote speaker Dr. Alice Prince (<u>www.catholicanddiverse.com</u>; <u>www.pathwaysunited.org</u>). Dr. Prince encouraged the students to love themselves and then extend that love to others so it can transform humanity. The students came away with the message to run toward their dreams and to believe they are unstoppable!

The other presentations were "Dining with Dignity" by Josie McCarthy, program manager of Food For Lane County's The Dining Room, "Land Acknowledgment & Cultural Awareness" by Josh Davies, 4J NATIVES Program, "Unconventional Humility: Finding the Lesson in the Line of Service" by Amber Alexander, a yoga instructor at the Oregon State Corrections Institution, and "Our New Neighbors" by David Ross & Zoë Livelybrooks from the Refugee and Immigration Services Program at Catholic Community Services. David and Zoë were joined by Zubair, a 14-year refugee from Afghanistan. The post-reflections revealed that many students were deeply impacted by the stories they heard and left the event with an appreciation for the struggles of others and a stronger desire to recognize the value of ALL people.
